AN ACT

Amending Titles 42 (Judiciary and Judicial Procedure) and 75 (Vehicles) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in 2 budget and finance, further providing for municipal 3 corporation portion of fines and establishing the Municipal 4 Law Enforcement Accreditation Fund; in rules of the road in 5 general, further providing for speed timing devices; and, in 6 powers of department and local authorities, further providing for State and local powers. 8 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania 9 10 hereby enacts as follows: Section 1. Section 3573(b) of Title 42 of the Pennsylvania 11 12 Consolidated Statutes is amended to read: 13 § 3573. Municipal corporation portion of fines, etc. * * * 14 15 (b) Vehicle offenses.--16 When prosecution under the provisions of Title 75 17 (relating to vehicles) for parking is the result of local police action, all fines, forfeited recognizances and other 18 forfeitures imposed, lost or forfeited shall be payable to 19

the municipal corporation under which the local police are organized.

- (2) Except as provided in [paragraph (3)] paragraphs (3) and (4), when prosecution under any other provision of Title 75 (except Chapter 77 (relating to snowmobiles and all-terrain vehicles)) is the result of local police action, one-half of all fines, forfeited recognizances and other forfeitures imposed, lost or forfeited shall be payable to the municipal corporation under which the local police are organized.
 - (3) When prosecution under 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802 (relating to driving under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) is the result of local police action, 50% of all fines, forfeited recognizances and other forfeitures imposed, lost or forfeited shall be payable to the municipal corporation under which the local police are organized, and 50% shall be payable to the county which shall be further divided as follows:
 - (i) Fifty percent of the moneys received shall be allocated to the appropriate county authority which implements the county drug and alcohol program to be used solely for the purposes of aiding programs promoting drug abuse and alcoholism prevention, education, treatment and research.
 - (ii) Fifty percent of the moneys received shall be used for expenditures incurred for county jails, prisons, workhouses and detention centers.
