A RESOLUTION

- 1 Honoring the life and service of the Reverend Theodore M.
- 2 Hesburgh, who led the University of Notre Dame as university
- president, and extending condolences to those whose lives
- were positively impacted by him.
- 5 WHEREAS, The Reverend Theodore M. Hesburgh was born May 25,
- 6 1917, in Syracuse, New York, to Anne Marie and Theodore Bernard
- 7 Hesburgh; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Father Hesburgh served as the president of the
- 9 University of Notre Dame for 35 years from 1952 until 1987,
- 10 making him the longest-tenured university president in the
- 11 United States; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Father Hesburgh passed away February 26, 2015, at 97
- 13 years of age at Holy Cross House on the campus of the
- 14 university; and
- 15 WHEREAS, During his tenure, the university doubled its
- 16 enrollment, significantly increased student aid and faculty
- 17 salaries, opened its doors to female students and transformed
- 18 from a small Catholic college into the world's preeminent
- 19 Catholic university; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Father Hesburgh's impact extended far beyond the
- 2 university and included significant advocacy in a wide array of
- 3 complex and controversial issues, including civil rights,
- 4 poverty and human rights, and challenged Catholic universities
- 5 to preserve their academic freedom and become "the critical,
- 6 reflective intelligence of the Church"; and
- WHEREAS, As a strong advocate in the civil rights movement,
- 8 Father Hesburgh served on the Civil Rights Commission and
- 9 endorsed the Civil Rights Act at a rally with the Reverend
- 10 Martin Luther King, Jr., in July 1964, after others had declined
- 11 to attend; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Father Hesburgh served as an advisor to
- 13 international leaders, four popes and nine presidents; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Father Hesburgh received numerous appointments, 150
- 15 honorary degrees, and many awards, including the Presidential
- 16 Medal of Freedom and the Congressional Gold Medal, the highest
- 17 civilian awards of the United States; and
- 18 WHEREAS, Father Hesburgh's life was honored and he was laid
- 19 to rest in the Holy Cross Community Cemetery at Notre Dame on
- 20 March 4, 2015; therefore be it
- 21 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives honor the life
- 22 and service of the Reverend Theodore M. Hesburgh, who devoted
- 23 his life to the education of others and worked to ensure social
- 24 justice, and extend its condolences to those whose lives were
- 25 positively impacted by him; and be it further
- 26 RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to
- 27 Reverend John I. Jenkins, C.S.C., University President, at 400
- 28 Main Building, Notre Dame, IN 46556.
