AN ACT

1 Amending the act of September 27, 1961 (P.L.1700, No.699),
2 entitled "An act relating to the regulation of the practice
3 of pharmacy, including the sales, use and distribution of
4 drugs and devices at retail; and amending, revising,
5 consolidating and repealing certain laws relating thereto,"
6 further providing for authority to administer injectable
7 medications, biologicals and immunizations and for laboratory
8 waiver.

9 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
10 hereby enacts as follows:

11 Section 1. Section 9.2(a) introductory paragraph and (5),
12 (c), (d) and (e) of the act of September 27, 1961 (P.L.1700,
13 No.699), known as the Pharmacy Act, amended or added July 11,
14 2022 (P.L.1224, No.80), are amended to read:

15 Section 9.2. Authority to Administer Injectable Medications,
16 Biologicals and Immunizations.--(a) The board shall by
17 regulation establish education and training standards and
18 practice guidelines pursuant to which pharmacists shall be
19 authorized to administer injectable medications, biologicals and
20 immunizations to persons [who are more than eighteen years of

1 age and influenza and COVID-19 immunizations by injectable or
2 needle-free delivery methods to persons five] three years of age
3 and older. Such standards and guidelines shall include, but not
4 be limited to, the following:

5 * * *

6 (5) For individuals under eighteen years of age, that
7 parental consent be obtained prior to administration.

8 [Administration of influenza and COVID-19 immunizations by
9 injectable or needle-free delivery methods shall be in
10 accordance with the immunization schedule established by the
11 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.]

12 * * *

13 (c) A supervising pharmacist shall report the administration
14 of immunizations under this section to the immunization registry
15 maintained by the Department of Health within seventy-two hours
16 of immunization administration and to the individual's primary
17 care provider in accordance with subsection (a) (7). Nothing in
18 this subsection shall be construed to prohibit a supervising
19 pharmacist from delegating the reporting of immunization
20 administration to a pharmacy intern or pharmacy technician.

21 (d) A pharmacist [or], pharmacy intern or pharmacy
22 technician who administers an [influenza or COVID-19]
23 immunization to an individual under eighteen years of age shall
24 inform the parent or adult caregiver of the importance of a
25 well-child visit with a pediatrician or other licensed primary
26 care provider and refer the patient as appropriate.

27 (e) A pharmacist who holds the authority to administer
28 injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations may
29 delegate the authority to administer:

30 (1) influenza and COVID-19 immunizations to a certified

1 registered nurse practitioner, physician assistant, registered
2 nurse or licensed practical nurse[.]; or

3 (2) COVID-19 immunizations that are authorized or that are
4 licensed by the United States Food and Drug Administration to
5 persons three years of age and older or childhood vaccinations
6 that are recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization
7 Practices to persons three years of age and older to a pharmacy
8 technician, if:

9 (i) The pharmacy technician:

10 (A) holds a national certification from the Pharmacy
11 Technician Certification Board or the National Healthcareer
12 Association; or

13 (B) is registered with the board.

14 (ii) The following conditions are met:

15 (A) The supervising qualified pharmacist is readily and
16 immediately available to the qualified pharmacy technician who
17 is administering the immunizations or vaccinations.

18 (B) The qualified pharmacy technician has completed a
19 practical training program that is approved by the Accreditation
20 Council for Pharmacy Education and that includes hands-on
21 injection technique and the recognition and treatment of
22 emergency reactions to vaccines.

23 (C) The qualified pharmacy technician has a current
24 certificate in basic cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

25 Section 2. Section 9.5 of the act is amended to read:

26 Section 9.5. Laboratory Waiver.--If a pharmacy holds a valid
27 certificate of waiver issued by the Centers for Medicare and
28 Medicaid Services, a pharmacy or pharmacist may order and
29 perform laboratory examinations and procedures for COVID-19,
30 influenza, respiratory syncytial virus and streptococcal

1 infections authorized or approved by the United States Food and
2 Drug Administration under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement
3 Amendments of 1988 (Public Law 100-578, 102 Stat. 2903) and
4 shall be exempt from the requirements under section 3 of the act
5 of September 26, 1951 (P.L.1539, No.389), known as "The Clinical
6 Laboratory Act."

7 Section 3. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
